

Part 39 | **3 Ways to Be Encouraged**

We find encouragement from **EACH OTHER**, (v. 1-3)



contribute & initiate

By 2030 the people of Wawasee Bible will engage in **10,000 Gospel Conversations**

So what *is* a "Gospel Conversation"?

First of all, by 10,000 we do not mean 10,000 people, but *conversations*.

<u>A Gospel Conversation is sharing the</u> <u>Good News of Jesus Christ with someone</u> <u>in need of knowing of his love and grace.</u>

A conversation that points to Jesus as the hero and gives testimony to his grace, as well as our own need for it, counts as a Gospel Conversation.

Here's three (of many!) types of Gospel Conversations:

- 1. I share with someone what Jesus is doing in my life *today*. Maybe something good, maybe bringing me through a hard time, maybe a point from Sunday's message that hit me, etc.
- 2. I share with someone my story of putting my faith in Christ.

We are sent to love people and invite them to follow Jesus with us

3. I share the truth of the Gospel, and encourage them to believe it themself.

Remember the key is to love. We're loved by Jesus, and so we're sent by Jesus to love others and invite them to follow him with us.

We'll share more soon, including some ideas to help you spark Gospel Conversations with the people God has sent *you* to!

Getting to Know You

Part of our goal at Life Group is just learning more about each other. Toward that end, here's two totally <u>random</u> questions to discuss and break the ice as you get going. Have everyone answer at least one:

- 1. Which historical time period would you most like to visit?
- 2. If you could have any view from your back porch, what would it be?

Looking back at your notes from this week's teaching, was there anything you heard for the first time, that caught your attention, challenged, or confused you?

Digging Deeper

Use this guide for further personal and group study this week.

- 1. Jesus's message to Paul in this week's passage was, "Do not be afraid," which is a very timely message for us today. How have the things you are afraid of or are concerned/worried about changed over the years?
- 2. This weekend Pastor Josh noted that one of the ways God encouraged Paul —and encourages us—is through other Christians. And we should note that Paul was active in seeking people out! It's easy to sit back and wait for people to befriend us, but we're also called to contribute to and *initiate* community and friendship ourselves. It usually when we contribute (and not simply consume) that we're most encouraged. Study **Romans 12:9-13**. What are ways we can *contribute* and *initiate* relationship with one another?

- 3. Another way God encourages us is when we get busy doing the mission he's given us alongside other Christians. — "We're sent to love people and invite them to follow Jesus with us." — Throughout the Book of Acts, we have seen that Paul had a calling to have conversations with people and tell them they didn't have to be spiritually lost. As a result he endured a tremendous amount of conflict, pain and suffering living out this calling. But he knew from personal experience the difference between being lost and being found by Jesus. Read Luke 15:1-10. Jesus tells two stories that give us some perspective on his view of spiritually lost people and might motivate us to go to those far from God, even when it's painful.
 - What similarities do you see in these stories?
 - What lessons do these stories teach us about those who are spiritually lost and God's attitude toward them?
 - What do Luke 19:10 and 2 Peter 3:9 add to your understanding of how God wants us to view those who are spiritually lost?
- 4. In the message this week, the fact that the synagogue leaders, Crispus and Sosthenes, became followers of Jesus is a great reminder that Jesus is still committed to "seek and save" the lost even if we don't think they would be interested. Is there someone in your life you once thought would never be interested in following Jesus who is now a follower of Jesus?
- During the Last Supper, Jesus knew how difficult the next few days would 5. be for His disciples as they struggled with fear, doubt and anxiety. He spent most of the dinner conversation preparing them for the challenges that were to come. Read John 14:1-3; 14:15-20; 14:27; 16:6-7.
 - What stands out to you in these passages from this conversation that could have provided the disciples with comfort and encouragement?
 - Which of Jesus' statements is most helpful to you as you potentially face fear and anxiety-producing circumstances in your life?

As you close, take time to pray for each other. Consider **dividing into separate** groups of men and women as you pray for one another.


