### **Getting Started**

Part of our goal together is getting to know more about one another. Are you more likely to act without thinking or to think without acting?

### Review...

1. Read Article 8 of our Statement of Faith aloud as a group.

**Review your message notes.** What stood out to you from the message this week? Do you have questions? Disagreements? Discuss it as a group.

## **Digging Deeper**

- 2. Read James 2:14-18.
- 3. **Re-read v.14-18 in a different translation.** What is the correlation between faith and deeds? Can you have one without the other? Do they oppose each other?
  - What happens if you have only faith?
  - What happens if you have only deeds?
- 4. In **verse 18** is James saying that it is deeds that save us?
- 5. Charles Spurgeon once said, "The grace that does not change my life, will not save my soul." Do you agree?

What is this? – Each week people from Wawasee Bible meet in small groups in various homes to learn about Jesus, pray, eat, laugh, and live life together. We call them Life Groups. The questions here are based on the sermon each week (often a parallel passage of Scripture), and guide each group's study. - 6. The Pharisees, who were arguably the most religious people of their time, are an example of having faith but not necessarily a "saving faith." How does Jesus' response to the Pharisees in **Matthew 23** further illustrate how we can have faith but miss the mark on having a saving faith?
- 7. In contrast to the seven woes we read in Matthew 23, Jesus gave us eight Beatitudes to show how we can live a life that demonstrates authentic faith. As you read through Matthew 5:1-11, jot down how the eight Beatitudes differ from the seven woes and then answer the following questions.
  - How would you explain each beatitude to someone who was brand new to Christianity?
  - Which beatitude is most challenging for you to live out in your own life?
  - How do the Beatitudes relate to being "salt and light" in Matthew 5:13-16?
- 8. What do the following verses teach us about the difference between knowledge and obedience according to God?
  - Luke 6:46-49 1 John 2:3-5 James 2:14-26
